



Philippe Le Corre is a Research Fellow at the Harvard Kennedy School and a Visiting Professor at ESSEC Business School. He is also an Affiliate with the French Institute for East Asia (IFRAE-CNRS) and the John K. Fairbank Center for Chinese Studies at Harvard, and an Associate Fellow with Fondation pour la Recherche stratégique in Paris. He is the author of several books on China including *China's Offensive in Europe* (Brookings Institution Press, 2016), and contributed chapters to several edited volumes including "Does the Rise of China Threaten the Transatlantic Partnership?" in *The China Questions 2* (Harvard University Press, 2022) and "China's Belt and Road Initiative: Implications for Europe" in *China-US-Europe Relations in a New Era*, (Routledge, 2020).

Speakers:

Miguel Otero-Iglesias is Senior Analyst at Elcano Royal Institute and Professor and Research Director of International Political Economy at the School of Global and Public Affairs and the Centre for the Governance of Change at IE University in Spain. In addition, he is Senior Research Fellow at the EU-Asia Institute at ESSCA School of Management in France.

His main areas of expertise are: international and comparative political economy, international and European monetary affairs, the international financial architecture, global economic governance and the power triangle between the US, the EU and China and theories of money. He is the author of *The Euro, the Dollar and the Global Financial Crisis: Currency Challenges seen from Emerging Markets* (New York, Routledge, 2015).

She co-leads the Research Initiative [Mapping Global China](#) and is the author of *Sovereignty in China. A Genealogy of a Concept since 1840* (CUP 2019) and co-editor of *The China Questions 2 – Critical Insights into US-China Relations* (HUP 2022). Before joining NYU Shanghai, she was a recipient of a three-year Marie-Curie fellowship at KU Leuven.

Marina Rudyak is an assistant lecturer and doctoral researcher at the Institute of Chinese Studies, Heidelberg University. Her research focuses on China as a global development actor, specifically Chinese foreign aid and development lending policy, the implications of the Belt and Road Initiative (BRI), and China in Central Asia and Africa. She is also interested in the political ideology of the Chinese Communist Party and coded communication in Chinese politics.



Lecture and Q&A: "Why does the Chinese autocracy care about and fear its people at the same time?" with prof. Chih-yu Shih

In the eyes of the western democracies the governance style of the Peoples Republic of China has taken the path towards autocracy. The communist party rule since 1949 has seen more and less autocratic eras and it is the firm conviction of many observers that the President and the Secretary General of the CCP, Xi Jinping, is now consolidating his power in order to finalize the process towards a full-fledged autocratic government. The XXth Party Congress, to be held this Fall should function as the platform for Xi to achieve this.

Professor Chih-yu Shih teaches China studies, anthropology of knowledge, and international relations theory in the Department of Political Science at National Taiwan University. Determined to recollect and re-present intellectual heritage in Asia, he has devoted his academic career for the past 30 years to researching, teaching, and writing on the cultural and political agency of human society. Shih’s publications consistently challenge the mainstream views on the law of human behavior and gather evidence of human agency from ethnic communities, developing countries, people in poverty, and so on. In his writings, Shih pays attention to the cultural meanings of civilizational components such as religion, language, ecology, and institution. He practices a multi-sited methodology reified primarily through field interviews, oral history, and archive research.

LAC shorts: With Fumio Kishida at the helm, Europe can no longer ignore Japanese security

LAC shorts are articles written by or interviews conducted with LeidenAsiaCentre researchers on important current developments in Asia. In this LAC short, LeidenAsiaCentre researcher [Anoma van der Veere](#) and Haruko Sato discuss the recent developments in Japan's foreign policy. They argue that Kishida has possibly taken the helm at the right time for Europe to deepen its security engagement in Asia, as there remain few countries in the region that share similar values and concerns.



With Fumio Kishida at the helm, Europe can no longer ignore Japanese security

Only hours after Russia invaded Ukraine in the morning of February 24th, Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida told a group of reporters he is committed to keeping the international order and that Japan will coordinate its response in line with the international community, particularly the G-7 states. Subsequent reports showed Kishida's statement was "surprisingly decisive and coherent".¹ Considering he came to power only 6 months ago in October 2021, Kishida demonstrated that Japan not only stands firm with those condemning Russian aggression, and that it also would act in concert with them to prove its resolve.²

Normally, the usually reticent Japan broke off the habit of resorting to cheap talk diplomacy (as it did in the 1991 Gulf War) in favour of more concrete actions. By sending military patrols such as "Operation Guardian Spirit" to the South China Sea, maritime patrols, warships, emergency flights, emergency rations, binoculars, flaresights, [and] medical equipment", the country sent a clear signal of support for Ukraine, thereby allying itself with Europe and the US.³ Japan also joined in when the G7 issued a joint statement that said: "we commit to phase out our dependency on Russian energy imports as soon as possible to contribute to the global reduction of Russian energy and to achieve a unified response to the Ukrainian crisis. And, to an extent, Japan has attempted to coordinate its policies vis-à-vis Russia in accordance with the G7, even before this statement, by, for example, moving to stop coal imports.⁴

For Europe, the country's current stance, one that is rare among Asian nations, signals an important point: Japan remains one of the few allies willing to directly cooperate on security issues, and will consequently become an increasingly valuable strategic partner in the region. Moreover, not since
